University of Liverpool	Bachelor of Veterinary Science (BVSc)	A-Level: AAA (including Chemistry and Biology)	Work experience recommended (minimum 10 weeks).
University of Nottingham	Veterinary Medicine and Surgery (BVM BVS)	A-Level: A*AA (including Chemistry and Biology)	Work experience required (minimum 4 weeks).
Royal Veterinary College, London	Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine (BVetMed)	A-Level: AAA (including Chemistry and Biology)	Extensive work experience required (minimum 4 weeks).
University of Bristol	Veterinary Science (BVSc)	A-Level: AAA (including Chemistry and Biology)	Work experience required (minimum 10 weeks).
University of Surrey	Veterinary Medicine and Science (BVMSci)	A-Level: AAB (including Chemistry and Biology)	Work experience required (minimum 4 weeks).
University College Dublin (UCD)	Bachelor of Veterinary Medicine (MVB)	Leaving Certificate: H1 in Chemistry, H2 in Biology, and H2 in one other subject	Minimum 60 hours of practical experience recom

Notes:

Work Experience: Most veterinary schools in the UK and Ireland require or strongly recommend that applicants have some form of relevant work experience, typically ranging from 4 to 10 weeks. This can include time spent in veterinary practices, farms, stables, kennels, or animal shelters.

Interview/Assessment: Some universities, like Cambridge, require an additional interview or assessment as part of the application process.

Other Qualifications: Some universities may accept equivalent qualifications such as the International Baccalaureate (IB), Scottish Highers, or European Baccalaureate with specific grade requirements in relevant subjects.
